FIRST PHASE OF AI PERFORMED

On the 20th of October 2016, all roads led to Mr. Bernard Del's home for the first ever mass artificial insemination of cows in Oseng'teti village of Muhoroni sub-County, Kisumu County. Farmers started trooping in as early as six in the morning for the activity that was organized by OSIEPE Practical Action in conjunction with

The International Livestock Research Institute (ILRI) which is coordinating the USAID Feed the Future funded Accelerated Value Chain Development (AVCD) project. The event following a ten-day period of animal preparation by the veterinary officers drawn from Kisumu and Homa Bay Counties.

A total of 33 cows were inseminated from Oseng'teti village as part of the first rollout plan. Other AI events are planned for the other 13 sites in which crush pens were constructed by OSIEPE team in Muhoroni. Many other guests and dairy farmers came along to witness the process including scientist from ILRO, members of the press from leading media houses in Kenya as well as the leaders from OSIEPE.

Speaking at the event, Dr. Lawrence Ochieng', the field coordinator of AVCD took the opportunity to thank OSIEPE group for partnering with ILRI to ensure that the project was a success. He said that the primary role of fixed time AI in milk deficiency counties was to improve the qualities of the existing animals. The selected animals had gone through hormonal sequence in preparation for the process. Present at the event too was Dr. James Rao from ILRI who also expressed his pleasure with the process and thanked the farmers for their corporation.

The coordinator of OSIEPE, Mr. Bernard Del also thanked ILRI for such a partnership and urged them to continue with their support. He expressed his happiness at the approach adopted involving local participation as a prerequisite to success. This is first ever project to be undertaken in Muhoroni sub-County and OSIEPE is proud to pioneer it.

MEAL REPORT REVEALS REAL CHANGES IN **HOUSEHOLDS**

The quarterly household level monitoring and technical support to OSIEPE Practical Action Members was conducted by the Monitoring, Evaluation and Learning Committee (MEAL). The report was shared for action planning at the 2nd Quarterly Meeting.

The MEAL committee was formed to oversee a participatory and social learning based tracking and assessment of change that members are making as individuals, as a group, in their households and in society as part of quality of life improvement and overall socio-economic transformation. The monitoring is based on OSIEPE Theory of Change (see link at http://osiepepa.weebly.com/our-results.html) and is aligned to each pillar. The MEAL committee also works in liaison with various organs of the CBO and local County authorities so as to offer advice on how to better the various projects that members have initiated for more learning.

All-in-all the exercise established that a lot of progress has been made on poultry farming, dairy, small livestock (shoats), horticulture and fish farming. Members are also investing in various agribusiness value chains and small enterprises even as they continue to invest in education of their children. The outcomes of massive capacity building and economic empowerment are steadily being felt and members are focused to realize sustainable change.
